



**Amendment A – NO** Prohibit Slavery and Involuntary Servitude in All Circumstances

Slavery is currently prohibited except as a punishment for a crime, Amendment A removes this exception. Advocates are using the simple message that if you vote NO you're supporting slavery; however, despite the archaic term, the hidden consequence is potential increase in lawsuits being filed by people who are incarcerated.

**Amendment 73 – NO** Tax Increase for Public Schools (was Initiative 93)

The proposition lays out a progressive income tax with a complicated structure which adds taxes to homeowners without considerations for inflation. The tax revenue is also not restricted and therefore not designated to teachers' salaries and not linked to academic achievement.

**Amendment 74 – YES** Fair Compensation for Regulatory Taking (was Initiative 108)

**Sponsored by the Colorado Farm Bureau, this is a property rights amendment! Current condition under the Colorado constitution is a property owner can suffer a regulatory taking with over a 90% reduction in property value and not be compensated—74 fixes this problem. Court precedent has shifted Colorado's view of takings and fair compensation out of alignment with the nation when it comes to a property impact from government action, and this amendment rights that wrong.**

**Support/Opposition:** Worth noting, the only two entities registered by the Secretary of State in favor of Proposition 112 on setbacks are also registered as opposition on Amendment 74—and one of the two opponents is a division of Earthworks which was founded by Gwen Lachelt!

**Amendment 75 – YES** Campaign Contributions (was Initiative 173)

Currently a candidate for office can donate their own money to their campaign without limit. Amendment 75 seeks to help close this contributions loophole when a candidate for office donates over \$1 million to their own campaign, by providing a 5-times increase for the individual contribution limits in that race. This is NOT a perfect solution, but under current conditions wealthy candidates, like Jared Polis for example, can effectively buy their way into government office.

**Proposition 109 – YES** Fix Our Damn Roads! (was Initiative 167)

**Sponsored by the Independence Institute, the formal title is "Authorize Bonds for Highway Projects." This proposition is a solution to too much road money going elsewhere and leaving our roads in disrepair. This is a bond proposal, not a tax increase, and all funds are expressly limited for transportation spending in Colorado for projects identified by the State's Transportation Commission.**

**Proposition 110 – NO** Transportation Tax Increase (was Initiative 153)

This is a tax increase which would NOT be limited to spending on road improvement. The tax money could be used on multi-modal transportation, mass transit and other transportation-related projects.
